

to the Malecontents to exhorte them to Peace; and we hear the Hungarian Lords assembled here, have resolved to desire the Emperor to Grant the free Exercise of the Protestant Religion, as it was formerly, and as the most effectual means to dispose the Malecontents to a Peace.

London, April 13. A curious Standard is preparing for the Tower, with St. Georges and St. Andrews Crosses joined, which it to be Display'd on May Day.

Vienna, April 13. The Cardinal of Saxo-Zyzi, as Archbishop of Gran, and Primate of Hungary, & Prince Esterhazy, Valaine of that Kingdom, use their utmost Endeavours to persuade the Emperor to an Accommodation with the Malecontents, and in order to that, to accept of the Mediation, and consent to the Guarantee of England and Holland. They are seconded by several Ministers well affected to the Common Cause, who Remonstrate to his Imperial Majesty, that it is his Interest to grant the Protestants of Hungary the free Exercise of their Religion, and protect them therein; the rather, because above one half of those in Arms are of that Perswasion, and have all along shew'd their inclination to an Accommodation, which otherwise had been desperate. This believ'd his Majesty will hearken to these Remonstrances, and thereby divide and separate the Malecontents; it being observ'd, that their Chiefs make Religion and Liberty serve as a Pretence to get the Government into their Hands. 'Tis certain, that it will be difficult to persuade Prince Ragoza to desist from his Pretensions to Transylvania, where the Emperor's Troops are driven from Place to Place, and have been oblig'd to abandon Klausenburg, and other Castles, and retire to Hirmanstad; but 'tis not confirm'd, that this last Place is as yet in the hands of the Malecontents. Count Rsbuin has laid down his Government of that Principality. Monsieur Huxten, the Czar of Muscovy's Resident here, has by his Masters Orders, paid a Visit to Prince's Sobiesky, & made some Overtures in Relation to the Prince her Consort, about the Crown of Poland. The Emperor has propos'd to the Consideration of the Electoral Colledge at Ratisbon, to put the Duke of Mantua into the Ban of the Empire, which 'tis thought will be agreed to; but not perform'd with so much Solemnity as that of the Electors of Bavaria and Cologne, because he is only a Vassal, and not a Prince of the Empire.

Paris, April 15. We hear the Republick of Genoa is very much dissatisfy'd that our Court has yielded Final to the Duke of Savoy, because 'tis puts him in a Condition to pursue his Pretensions against them; and we are inform'd that they have sent an Express to the States of Holland, to complain of those Pretensions, and of the Contributions the Emperor demands of them. All the Reports about the Marquis de Langalerie having kill'd a German Prince for speaking disrespectfully of the King, &c. are false; nor can we give any Credit to the Story of the King's having agreed to that Marquis going into the Venetian Service.

Breslau, April 16. Eight thousand Swedes are come to Goldberg in Silesia, and their Officers have view'd the River Oder as far as Glogou. 'Tis said King Stanislaw is to join them with 10000 Men the beginning of next Month, in order to march to Poland. Orders are arriv'd here from the Court of Vienna to allow the Swedes free Passage, and what else they want for their Money.

Dresden, April 18. General Pakut is strictly guarded in his Chamber by the Swedes, where 12 Soldiers continually watch him with their drawn Swords, and 30 more keep Guard without in the same Posture. 'Tis said King Augustus has given to Prince Jami Sobieski some Lands in Saxony for the 200000 Crowns he owes him.

New-York, Sept. 8. His Majesty's Ship Tritons Pr'z3 Sails the first fair Wind on a Cruise.

We had Advice last Week from Philadelphia, that a Sloop was arriv'd there from Curacoa, and a Ship from Exeterpool with Welsh Passengers, but what Passage we

know not. That a Ship of 20 or 24 Guns from Newfoundland is come there for Provisions, who is a Privateer with his Royal Highness Prince Georges Commission. Also that a Ship from Bristol was arriv'd in Virginia the 12th of August, with Advices, that two Men of War with a Fleet for Virginia had put to Sea, but forced back with contrary Winds, and were to Sail again in June. The Philadelphia Post not yet come in, else should have had a more particular Account.

Viseber and Braddick Sailed last week for Boston, and Carter for Carolina.

Rhode Island, Sept. 12th. The Prize Privateer Sloop brought in here on Tuesday last, is the same that was at Block Island about three weeks ago, who had taken four Prizes, viz two Fishing Shallops, and one Fish from New-London, and Smalago from Boston.

Braintree, Sept. 13. On Wednesday last the 10th Curran, the Reverend Mr. Hugh Adams, was Ordained Pastor of the South-Church in this Town.

Boston. On Wednesday the 10th Current, there came an Express to his Excellency from the Governour of Rhode Island, with advice, That being informed of a French Privateer's being in Martha's Vineyard Sound; On the 7th instant he had Man'd and fitted out two Sloops, under the Command of Major William Wanton, and Lieut. Col. John Wanton, who returned the 9th Current, and brought with them as Prize, a large Man of War Sloop, Commissioned from Placentia, mounted with 4 great Guns and 4 Patterarocs, was man'd with 49 men; which Sloop they took on Monday last the 8th Instant, in the foresaid Sound. The Privateer Engaged the Lieut. Col. near three hours, before the Major could get to his Assistance; in which Dispute the French Captain and three of his men were kill'd, his Lieutenant and some others wounded; and on our part never a man kill'd, and but three wounded.
