Introduction

This 1778 unpublished letter from Diego de Gardoqui, head of the commercial firm of Joseph Gardoqui and Sons in Bilbao, Spain, to Arthur Lee, a diplomat from Virginia, documents Spanish contributions to the American Revolution.

Prior to this correspondence, the Second Continental Congress had appointed Arthur Lee, Benjamin Franklin, and Silas Deane as commissioners to France. Their aim, beginning in September 1776, was to gather foreign support for the American Revolution. In early 1777, Lee traveled to Spain to secure aid. In March, he secretly met in Spain with Diego de Gardoqui, of Joseph Gardoqui y Hijos, and the Marquis de Grimaldi, former minister of state, in the city of Burgos. They could not meet in Madrid because they wanted to avoid raising the suspicions of the British diplomats at the Spanish court.

As a result of these meetings, the pretense of Spanish neutrality was maintained while Spanish assistance was secured. Lee reported to Congress that Spain would open a secret line of credit worth four million *reales de vellón*, equivalent to half a million Continental dollars (more than \$17 million in 2024 dollars). The trading company Joseph Gardoqui and Sons, in turn, provided the Spanish blankets, tents, boots, and uniforms that kept hundreds of Continental Army soldiers warm at Valley Forge during the harsh winter of 1777. The firm proved an excellent choice for funneling the Spanish-made goods to the Continental Army because it had established commercial routes between Bilbao and New England.

This April 1778 letter attests to Spain's faithful support of the American Revolution. Gardoqui updates Lee on shipments of blankets, credited and debited funds in the American accounts, and the possibility of buying Spanish uniforms for American troops.

This correspondence suggests that Spain's declaration of war on England on June 21, 1779, was not a departure in Spanish policy, but rather the extension of an already strong commitment to the United States.

On the 15th -ulto we adviced you the liberty we had than taken to value on your Account on Mr. LeGrand of Paris three bills ammounting to Livers 14599, the paymment whereof we Recommended to your care with a Request of your placing it's ammount at the Exchange of 77 1/2 & 0 to our debitt in Riales 56733 & 29 mis of Vellon which Sum was duelly pass'd by us to your Creditt: we also transmitted you under the same datte Invoice of 92 Balles containing 2296 Blanketts shipt on Board the John Cap^t Azaraiah Woodbury for Boston the ammount whereof if Right beg'd you would Creditt us in Riales 67125 & 15 mis of Vellon all which must beg leave to confirm again advicing you with pleasure that the above Vessell departed hence with a fine wind the same day 15th & cordially wish may safely Reach his desired home; therefore continueing our Blankett Exports with all possible Expedition have now also to informe you our haveing shipt for Glowcester Cape Ann on the Brigg *George* Cap^t Jobbe Knight as you will see by the within Invoice 75 Bales containing 1926 fine large Palencia Blanketts consigned in Boston as the formers to James Warren Esq^r as such be pleased order the same to be Examined & if free from Errors after due Examination Creditt us its ammount in Riales 55185 & 11 mis of Vellon with which your Account stands duelly debitted: Cap^t Knight was dispatched the 28th & the weather being favourable suppose sailed yesterday, of which should we Receive a true Account before this is Sealed up, depend on being duelly informed of a Governour.
